Do you use the yellow Air Ambulance recycling skips?

As part of the Parish Council's drive to improve and expand parking for cars at the edges of the village (to ease pressure in the centre) we are looking at creating an additional car park, albeit a small one, where there were formerly recycling skips. These have all moved on, since the advent of kerbside collections, apart, that is, from the yellow ones which collect items for the Air Ambulance charity. We obviously want to do all we can to support the Air Ambulance, which, as many of you will know, has helped with emergencies all around the parish on many occasions, one very recently. Is this small bay on The Rake really the best site for them? Does your household actually use them on a regular basis, or are they more used by people passing through? Tree Works Progress

An application has gone in to the PDNPA Tree Officer for the proposed tree-works that fall within the conservation area of the village. Permission to go ahead is normally granted within six weeks, so work is not going to start before mid-November. This is actually a better time to be working within a wooded environment, as you can see what you are doing with most of the leaves fallen. Two Ash trees, with severe Ash die-back, are being felled behind the toilet block – before they demolish it by dropping limbs! This is outside the conservation area, so work may start here sooner than the main jobs, which are at Fere Mere and *Rake End Wood* – I did not know until recently that the latter was once the village tip – whether official or unofficial, I am not sure. We must be talking many decades ago, as the trees that were planted on top of it have now reached a fine state of maturity; there are Beech, Ash and Lime, amongst others. Once the woodland has been thinned a little, with a little more light let in, woodland shrubs and flowers are sure to become established and the transformation from eyesore to biodiverse habitat will be complete. We just need to discourage the casual dumping of rubbish over the wall – this may be because folk have come in search of the recycling facilities which are no longer there, or even from some memory of it being a tip in past... Whatever, if we care for it, this tiny patch of woodland has the potential to be an asset to the village, especially if we can create a small visitors' car park next to it, where the skips once stood.

Nature Notes... or 'hweet' of the day?

Very few birds bother singing during October. The top seasonal exception is the Robin, which likes to establish a winter territory in our gardens and woods. Listen carefully and you will notice that the song is slightly different to that heard in Spring; it has a more wistful tone. To our ears, this seems to suit the time of year; like it's saying goodbye to Summer, but the difference from the birds' point of view is more likely that they are not needing to attract a mate. The other slightly more unusual October songster, I have noticed – at least in and around our garden – is the Chiffchaff. Unusual because, by the end of the month, they have all flown to Africa, to return in March – and it's the first migrant songbird to be heard in Spring. It must be worth defending a small edge-of-woodland territory simply for all the greenfly and other insects to be had there for this short while. They are such tiny birds and need to take on a good store of energy for the huge journey. The song is easy to catch – 'chiffchaff'! The call is 'hweet'.

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
