#### Nature Notes – Winter Visitors

Remember that wonderful display of May Blossom (i.e. Hawthorn) in the late Spring? Well, it has converted into the most bountiful crop of haws I can remember seeing and no more so than in Fern/Fere Dale, where a perfect larder for our visiting Winter Thrushes is all laid out. The other day there must have been a couple of hundred Fieldfares feasting all through the dale; these are the plump-looking, purple-tinged birds, about the same size as our resident Mistle Thrush and they visit the UK from the continent in large numbers, escaping the cold and in search of our fruits. They are strikingly beautiful, if you are able to get up close, or have a pair of binoculars and they are noisy; that loud, *'tchack-tchack-tchack!'* you will hear is unmistakeable and one of *the* sounds of late Autumn/Winter for me, along with the sound of wild geese passing high overhead.

There have been noisy rows breaking out amongst the Blackbirds in the dale and our gardens. Now, we think of Blackbirds as being 'local', but where you hear them arguing like this, it's almost certainly a sign that it's a dispute between our resident birds and ones that have come over with the Fieldfares and Redwings from Europe. The Redwing is altogether slimmer and quieter, so is easily missed and can look very like our Song Thrush at first glance. The odd one has turned up in our garden pecking at fallen apples. The most distinctive feature is a creamy stripe over the eye; the 'red wing' is only properly seen when it takes flight, being mostly underneath.

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
