From your District Councillor, Laura Mellstrom:

Bus services are under the remit of the County Council, so there are limits to what the District Council can do to improve matters, but the Full Council meeting on 14 December agreed that more needs to be done about services to rural communities in particular, which members acknowledged are unreliable and not as good as the bus services for Ashbourne and Matlock. The District Council voted to set up an All-Party Transport Group and to seek an urgent meeting with the County Council and Bus Service Improvement Plan Partnership, to ask for a reassessment of how the £47m in Government funding for bus improvements is being invested. [It may be a long battle, but let's hope we can at least get back to what we had in Monyash – Ed.]

Tree works at Fere Mere

I have just come back from Fere Mere where I caught up with Tom and Jo Scoggins at the very end of their work on the tiny woodland there. It is, as expected, a dramatic change, with the very tall, diseased Ash trees felled. You can see, even now before any leaves and shoots have got going, how much natural regeneration is going to happen in the Spring. T&J have done a wonderful, careful job in not damaging any of the very young trees – Hazel, Yew, Hawthorn, etc. – trees that had self-sown over the years and so, with a little patience, the picture will transform from the rather bare scene into one of abundant growth with all the daylight that can now flood in. The well-established Limes, Cherries and healthy Ash will also benefit from having more space around their canopies. Better air circulation means that fungal diseases are less likely to take hold.

We had another look and discussion over the Ash tree in the verge/next to the wall on Rakes Road and with *'if in doubt leave it'* as the general attitude, we are going to monitor this tree for now, although it was down for felling, having signs of Ash die-back. Ash trees that are out in the open do tend to fare better than ones in a woodland setting when it comes to Ash die-back – for the reason above, to do with air circulation and light. We shall watch it carefully over the next year or so; it poses no immediate risk to pedestrians or cars. If you spot any orange dots on trees that remain at Fere Mere, it is because we decided to save them.

Nature Notes – touching base

February is traditionally the month when Rooks start to revisit their old nests, to make repairs ahead of egg-laying. I have noticed, even through Christmas and January, one of the pairs that nest in treetops next to our house simply stopping for a while, as if to remind themselves that this, for a few months, will be 'home'. First thing in the morning, as they fly out for a feed in the fields, one will sometimes drop down and give a soft caw to the other. A gentle reminder that Spring is not too far away. The commonest question I have been asked on my Birdsong Walks, (starting again in April) is: What's the difference between a Rook and a Crow? (i.e. Carrion Crow). My rule of thumb is: If it sounds warm and friendly, that's the Rook; if it sounds *anything like* a Dalek, that'll be the Carrion Crow, or 'Black Marauder' as I knew them from my childhood. They are, of course, both 'Crows', in one sense, being members of that family, along with Jackdaws, Magpies, Jays, Ravens, etc.
